Secular Faith by Todd Macalister

"I have great faith in a seed." Henry David Thoreau

With this being a newsletter, and since some types of news can involve new ideas, I thought it could be worthwhile to start with some brief thoughts from a book I recently read parts of: "This Life: Secular Faith and Spiritual Freedom" by Martin Hägglund.

In this, the term "faith" is used in a different way than the quote above by Henry Thoreau, but both of these seemed worth a mention.


The main point Hägglund makes is that while, in major traditional religions, faith can involve trust in a deity or force (such as karma or tao) that is eternal and often all-powerful, a secular view, like a naturalist view, sees all of life as finite and vulnerable, and where living things are dependent on one another.

With this, rather than aspiring toward eternal life or cosmic rewards, from a secular perspective (which Hägglund sees as based in the Latin word, saecularus) we may commit to projects that are worldly and temporal. And with only this one life to live, as we try ourselves to live longer and to live better, we can also find value and meaning in trying to help one another. As Hägglund put it, "we <u>need</u> to take care of one another because our lives are fragile" and, also, because we

recognize that, if we do not act, someone, or some things (such as the many varied lives in natural environments) may be lost.

In this view, meaning comes not in spite of our lives or achievements being of limited duration. Instead, it is only *because* life is finite that we can have faith that what we do matters. And with this comparison he feels that an eternal life "is not only unattainable but also undesirable, since it would eliminate the care and passion that animate my life".

To switch from religious philosophy to celestial events, another point of interest this month is that September 22 is the date of the equinox; where, throughout the whole world, the length of day (from sunrise to sunset) is the same 12 hours for all people and all living things. And, while this may not have a major impact on any of us, it can be nice to have occasions to focus on things that are shared by all (and also to enjoy a middle ground that, at this time of year, is as balanced as it gets in each location – not too dark or too light, not too hot or too cold, and often near to a place that seems "just right").


